

**Rectory Revelation** Facts Revealed The writer of the letter to the Hebrews captures this fact, in pointing out that Jesus is not 'unable to feel sympathy for our weaknesses' (4:15). Jesus dealt with disappointment too – we see it in His response to His townsfolk's lack of faith, and His closest friends falling asleep when He needed them most.

If disappointment was an experience for Jesus, we can be sure it will be an experience for those who follow Him. Recognising there is no quick fix, on-demand, life-hack solution might be a way to help the students we love to come to terms with their disappointment.

To do so might even be the first step towards a more profound truth: Christians do not believe that we face disappointment alone. He is IMMANUEL – God with us. And as we discover that reality, our disappointment might not only be validated, it might be transformed.

Knowing Jesus and trusting Him is a hope that 'does not disappoint us' (Romans 5:5). Because in God's story, disappointment – whether a missed goodbye or a Saviour on a cross – is only momentary. The truth is that He's putting this not-as-it-should-be world back together, as His kingdom comes, day by day. This is the hope of the gospel. And that kind of hope is good news for all of us, including students.



## **Reflection - By Neil**

We can take one look at someone and without trying make all kinds of assumptions about them, and we often assume things about them that simply aren't true.

For example, I've always been tall. When I started primary school I was the tallest in the school on day one, the same with secondary school. Back in the 1970's, I was playing on a swing in a playground when another parent challenged my Mum. *'Why are you letting your older son play on the swings for the little kids?'* I was only 5. It was assumed I was older than I was.

I suspect if we were all to sit round and share, we could all say that at some point, some one, has made an assumption about us - it happens to everyone.

It happened to Jesus all the time. The people he met during his ministry made many assumptions.

- Some thought he was an earthy Messiah, one who would save them from the Romans.
- Others thought he was from the devil.
- Some saw him as a wonderful teacher, but when he began defining himself as more, they couldn't handle his claims and left him.

The same is still true today. Many people look at Jesus as no more than an incredible teacher who showed us the right way to live, shared the truth about God and helped people live a good life.

However, Jesus was far more than that.

In John, Jesus says, "I am the way, the truth and the life."

- Jesus is not just one who shows the way, He is the way.
- He does not just speak the truth, He is the truth.
- Jesus is not just a role model who demonstrated the godly life, He is the One who gives life.

We often base our impressions of a person on just one or two experiences, without actually knowing everything about them.

Yet, even those closest to Jesus didn't recognise the truth of his identity. They were looking on the surface, basing their assumptions on their own ideas, wants and needs. But Jesus repeated over and over again that he was far more than just a man who came to be a king or role model. He is the Living God, the One from whom all gifts come – life, hope, peace, joy and grace.

There are many like Philip in today's world, those who do not see Jesus as he really is – the Way, the Truth and the Life. We cannot know the Father without Jesus, for Jesus is the full revelation of God to humanity so that we can know the Truth and have Life.

It was reported last weekend that during 'normal' times only 6% of the population attend a religious service. However, they estimate that the other weekend 25% attended some sort of online or televised service, and 44% are now praying.

He is truly the only way for us to have a relationship with God, and so I pray that those 25% continue to get to know the living Lord as the Way the Truth and the Life.

#### 8-10 May 2020

When VE Day dawns on 8th May 2020 it will be 75 years since the guns fell silent at the end of the war in Europe. Years of carnage and destruction had come to an end and millions of people took to the streets and pubs to celebrate peace, mourn their loved – ones and to hope for the future, but not forgetting those still in conflict until 15th August when it was announced that Japan had surrendered unconditionally to the Allies, effectively ending World War II.

The 75th anniversary will provide our nation, and our friends around the world, with an opportunity to reflect on the enormous sacrifice, courage and determination of people from all walks of life who saw us through this dark and terrifying period.

We will remember the members of the Armed Forces and Merchant Navy from many countries who gave their lives or returned home injured in body and mind, the hard-working women and men who operated the factories, mines, shipyards and farms, and ARP wardens, police officers, doctors, nurses, fireman, local defence volunteers and others who toiled day and night selflessly on the home front during difficult frightening and uncertain times.

## **Rectory Revelation**

#### Did You know

The Great Pyramids in Egypt were the world's tallest structures for a staggering 3,871 years, until the construction of Lincoln Cathedral in 1311. No-one knows for certain how tall Lincoln Cathedral was, however, as its three spires have all been destroyed, leaving it just 83 metres tall.





It is generally agreed that the largest spire, which was destroyed in a storm in 1549, extended its height to 160 metres (525ft).

Visible from miles around is the golden ball atop St Lawrence's Church in West Wycombe. It is 8 feet in diameter, contains seating for up to sex people, and was reputed to be a meeting place for the Hellfire Club, a society of rich and riotous rakes (motto: "do what thou wilt.")

The Earl of Sandwich, William Hogarth and John Wilkes were thought to be members.

## **10TH MAY – COMGALL, THE SAINT FOR THOSE IN EDUCATION**

Here is a great saint for all teachers, head teachers and principals of educational institutions, and indeed anyone whose vocation is to train and equip others.

For Comgall (c 516 - c 601) was founder and first abbot of Bangor, which became the largest monastery in Ireland. And large means LARGE - for including several daughter houses, the total population is reckoned to have been 3,000.

If you have ever run an educational institution of 3,000 pupils (!), you will know it takes a special kind of person to cope with that, and Comgall seems to have been perfect for the job. A biographer at the time called him 'the outstanding father of the monks in Ireland, known for his insistence on study and strict discipline.'

Comgall's rule had what it took to succeed. It was 'strict, holy and constant', both 'graced with the hope of salvation and made perfect in love', according to the 7th century writer Antiphoner of Bangor. Above all, followers were to love Christ, and reject the love of money.

Comgall also had a gift for friendship, for on the death of a close friend, he wrote in grief: 'My soul-friend has died and I am headless; you too are headless, for a man without a soul-friend is a body without a head.'

Like heads and principals today, Comgall knew a lot of important people. He had trained Columbanus and knew Columba, whom he visited on Iona. They even preached the Gospel together in Inverness, to the pagan chieftain Brude.



### **CELEBRATING 5 YEARS OF THE CENTENARY PROJECT**



## **Christian Aid Week**

This Sunday, 10th May, marks the beginning of Christian Aid Week with a new Coronavirus Appeal. The coronavirus outbreak threatens the health of our neighbours near and far.
