

1 Corinthians 1:18-25

18 For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. **19** For it is written: 'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise;

the intelligence of the intelligent I will frustrate.'

21 For God in his wisdom saw to it that the world would never find God through human brilliance, and then he stepped in and saved all those who believed his message, which the world calls foolish and silly. 22 It seems foolish to the Jews because they want a sign from heaven as proof that what is preached is true; and it is foolish to the Gentiles because they believe only what agrees with their philosophy and seems wise to them. 23 So when we preach about Christ dying to save them, the Jews are offended and the Gentiles say it's all nonsense. 24 But God has opened the eyes of those called to salvation, both Jews and Gentiles, to see that Christ is the mighty power of God to save them; Christ himself is the center of God's wise plan for their salvation. 25 This so-called "foolish" plan of God is far wiser than the wisest plan of the wisest man, and God in his weakness—Christ dying on the cross—is far stronger than any man.

Centenary Project Youth Worker Newsletter

Hello!

It's March, yay, and if you go by the meteorological calendar then it's officially spring... as I write this we are one week on from the roadmap and there is one week left before children and young people head back to school and college, it seems like we can look ahead to better days for definite. I'm currently 27 weeks pregnant, which is flying by, and feel cautiously optimistic that Harry will be born in to more normal times.

The roadmap of course changes things for youth and family work, from the 29th of March groups of up to 15 can take place outside, from the 12th of April groups of 15 indoors and from the 21st of June no restrictions, of course subject to the dates changing. It looks like Cafe 3:30 may be able to return probably in September, and we can look at what we can offer for CATALYST, of course my maternity leave slightly impacts all these plans.

In February I joined a small focus group led by the Church of England National Youth Evangelism Officer to look at youth work post covid and how the Church of England can better support and resource youth workers across the country; I'm very blessed in that much of what they were discussing I receive from being part of the Centenary Project.

This Saturday I will be 'attending' the Diocese children, youth and family workers conference, Joined Up, there are over 20 workshops on offer and some brilliant keynote speakers so I'm sure it'll be a fantastic, equipping, day which I'm looking forward to.

Also his week I begin my training on 'Breaking County Lines' learning more about how to prevent vulnerable young people becoming victims of trafficking for the purpose of moving drugs which takes place over 3 Thursday evenings. It is so important that I keep up with latest research, guidance and training so I am best equipped to support the young people I work with and it is fantastic that this is available online during this time.

Lent Course Week 2

For the second week of the Lent Course we looked at how shoes, showers and baths can help us focus on our journey of faith, through lent and beyond. Discussions were based on the book 'At Home in Lent' by Gordon Giles.

How many pairs of shoes do you have? What do your shoes say to you about your journey and the journeys of others? Shoes can be seen as objects of hope, speaking to us of journeys made and those yet to be travelled. These pictures don't initially seem to be pictures of hope at all. The first is from Yad Vashem, the World Holocaust Remembrance Centre in Jerusalem. It shows a pile of leather shoes, 'just a few of the millions, worn by those entering the gas chambers. Shoes carefully put down by those who either thought they were going for a shower, or those who knew they were not'.

The second is a picture of a memorial along the side of the Danube in Budapest. Here the Jews were asked to take off their shoes before being shot and falling into the river. The shoes are cast in iron as a lasting memorial. These shoes say to us 'do not walk this way, do not take this path of hate and horror'. We continue to walk on, the human spirit keeps going, we continue to walk in the light and hope of Christ.

In these verses Paul encourages Timothy to keep journeying in faith, as he himself has done. We can't walk in anyone else's shoes, others can buy us a pair of shoes, or give us a map to follow, but we have to walk the path ourselves. Next time you

pick up a pair of shoes, think about how far they will travel and why.

At the end of our journey we will appear before God with bare soles and bare souls. Standing before the burning bush Moses was told to remove his shoes as he was standing on holy ground. Have you ever tried praying with bare feet, connected to the earth that God has created?

Do you shower every day? Do you pray every day? Is doing either necessary or helpful? Do you at least owe it to others to do so? Is cleanliness net to godliness? This is not from the Bible, but is an old proverb written by Sir Frances Bacon. Do you like to bathe in faith, or have a quick shower?

As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only me but also to all who have longed for his appearing

2 Timothy 4:6-8

Shower, o heavens from above, and let the skies rain down righteousness: Let the earth open, that salvation may spring up, and let it cause righteousness to sprout up also: I the Lord have created it.

Isaiah 45:8 send.

The main purpose of a shower is the efficient and effective cleaning of our bodies, showers can also wake us up. In prayer we lift our faces upwards to God, too. See and be seen by God. As the living waters pour down, we are bathed in righteousness and love. We can step out of the shower into the new day, awake, cleansed, renewed and ready to welcome all the Lord send.

One of the Pharisees asked Jesus to eat with him, and He went to the Pharisees house and took his place at the table. And a woman in the city, who was a sinner, having learned that he was eating in the Pharisees house, brough an alabaster jar of ointment. She stood behind Him at His feet, weeping, and began to bathe His feet and then to dry them with her hair. Then she continued kissing his feet and anointing them with the ointment. Now when the Pharisee who had invited him saw it, he said to himself, 'if this man were a prophet, He would have known who and what kind of woman this is who is touching Him- that she is a sinner'....then turning towards the woman (Jesus) said to Simon, 'Do you see this woman? I entered your house; you gave me no water for my feet, but she has bathed my feet with her tears and dried them with her hair. You gave me no kiss, but from the time came she has not stopped kissing my feet. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she has anointed my feet with ointment. Therefore, I tell you, her sins, which were many have been forgiven; hence she has shown great love.

Luke 7:36-39, 44-47.

Or do you prefer to bathe? Jesus would not have been familiar with Roman baths, bathing in that way was for the rich. For others the focus was washing their hands, face and feet. The washing of the feet of guests was standard practice, as feet were dirty from wearing open sandals. Feet were to be washed and maybe oils applied, there was an element of pampering, making the guest feel good. This would be the role of a servant, it was a lowly role. Remember in the upper room it was Jesus who did this for his disciples.

Baths are more leisurely than showers, and often give an opportunity for 'me time', could it become 'we time', a place of retreat from our busy lives, a time to reflect and pray. Church on a Sunday could be seen as bathing, everyday prayer can be seen as a 5 minute shower. There is a place for both.

A Prayer

Christ Jesus, you are the living water by which we are all cleansed and refreshed. Pour down your love from above, that we may be renewed in your work and prayer this and every dat. Amen.

Father God, bathe me I the warm waters of mercy, that I may be cleansed from my sin and soaked in your love Amen.

Next Week

We have chosen to look at kettles, electricity and spectacles next week. We would love you to join us as we explore and learn together. There will be a session on the Tuesday of Holy Week.

The recycled bishop

Chad should be the patron saint of any modern bishop whose consecration is questioned by another bishop. Chad was consecrated a bishop, then deposed – and then re-consecrated!

It all began about the middle of the 7th century, when Oswiu, King of Northumbria, made Chad the bishop of the Northumbrian see. But due to a scarcity of appropriate bishops, two dubious bishops did the job of consecrating him. This led to Theodore, Archbishop of Canterbury, deciding to depose him about three years later.

Chad took his dismissal with good heart, and peacefully retired. But then Theodore had second thoughts: Chad was of excellent character: humble, devout, and zealous. So, Theodore re-consecrated him – to be the first bishop of the Mercians. Second time around, Chad was a great success – again.

When Chad died in about 672AD, he was quickly venerated as a saint. People took a great fancy to his bones, believing that they would bring healing. Even today, four large bones, dating from the 7th century, and believed to be Chad's, are in the R.C. cathedral in Birmingham.

Bishops today may still argue about consecration, but they are unlikely to have their bones disturbed.

Money Matters

We are so thankful to everyone who has continued to give generously during lockdown. Whilst both our churches have taken some kind of financial hit during the lockdown, it hasn't been as severe as some.

Of course, heating, lighting and water costs, along with clergy/CP worker expenses have come down, postage, photocopying and resources for the Cafe 3.30 packs each month have seen a big increase. At the same time income from weddings, baptisms and church funerals have dropped significantly, and of course we've not been able to do any fundraising, which both parishes rely upon.

The Diocese has taken a large hit as many churches have struggled to pay parish share and cover the ongoing bills, leaving a deficit of 17% in the budget this year. I pray that both our parishes can meet our share this year.

I'm not asking you to give more, although it would be very welcome! Instead, could I echo the words of the Apostle Paul to the Church.

Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.


The scheme is working really well for our church with a considerable number now taking advantage of the scheme. Best of all - its FREE (my favourite price).
